Instructions for use

1. Download or print this Home Emergency Plan template.
2. Schedule a time when all household members are available to discuss each component of your Home Emergency Plan.
3. Record all key personal information and actions that you agree to in this planning template. You can choose to either type or handwrite your responses.
4. Add a copy of your completed Home Emergency Plan to your Home Emergency Kit and, if possible, save a copy electronically so it can be accessed if you are away from home when an emergency occurs.
5. It is important to keep your plan updated with current information, so make a point of scheduling a time to update it at least once each year.

Evacuation checklist

What will you do prior to evacuation?

Will you:

- Ensure that vehicles are full of fuel?
- Know where you are evacuating to?
- Know the preferred evacuation route?
- Check on neighbours?

What will you do when you are evacuating?

Will you:

- Pack an emergency kit?
- Pack a copy of your Emergency Plan?
- Pack important documents and valuables?
- Pack medication and water supplies?
- Turn off mains supply for power, gas and water?
- Shut down solar power systems using the manufacturer's instructions?
- Sandbag internal drains & toilets if flooding is imminent?
- Store electrical items off the ground? Call your out-of-town contact before you leave and once you arrive at the evacuation location?
- Secure and lock your home and proceed to your predetermined evacuation location?

Other considerations
